- Cop-cameras are going up in our area. These are cameras that take pictures to alert the police, and one of them is at the Thorndale/Winthrop corner.
- The Chicago Park District has received funds to begin cleaning the 6171 N. Sheridan area.
- Nookies restaurant has signed the papers to occupy half a block on Bryn Mawr.
- Construction on the Senn campus park will start in June.
- Renovation work continues at the Broadway Armory.
- New stoplights will be installed at the Foster/Sheridan intersection to aid pedestrians crossing the street. Also a camera will be installed to monitor automobiles crossing on the red light. The Hollywood/Sheridan intersection will also be reconstructed next year with a better design, making it easier for pedestrians to cross.
- The electrical work has been completed in preparation for the installation of a stoplight at the Glenlake/Broadway intersection. Due to this, the entrance to Dominick's will be reconfigured.
- The construction of a playground at George Lane Park should begin this summer.
- ASCO (Association of Sheridan Road Condominium and Co-op Owners) will have a speaker at a general meeting sometime in June or July to explain new election procedures passed by the state of Illinois.

Hallway remodeling project update:

As of May 26, the first phase (painting prep) and second phase (carpet installation) are completed. The third phase (painting of closet doors & frames) is completed from 45 down to 30. The fourth phase (light fixture installation) is completed from the 45 down to 30. The fifth phase (finishing paint work) is completed from 45 down to 30. Please note some areas may appear unfinished or improperly done; these matters will be addressed while the project is in progress through a weekly walkthrough by the contractor(s) and management. Some floors may take longer than others, but please be patient — we want the contractors to do a thorough job. Also, paint colors and carpet design can't be changed. These were voted on and paid for a year ago, so please do not make any requests for changes because they will not be accepted. If an accident happens to the carpet, please contact management or maintenance immediately for clean-up. This will help to maintain the upkeep of the new carpeting.

Facade inspection: Beginning in early June, Golf Construction and Klein & Hoffman will be working on the South & East facades per City of Chicago ordinance. A detailed notice will go out prior to explain the scope of the work and residents' requirements.

Grass on our parkways: New sod has been planted along Sheridan Road & Glenlake Avenue and we are doing our best to keep it looking very nice. Please curb your dog. We have enough problems with other buildings' residents using our lawn as a dog walk; we don't need our own residents to be doing this. Please use our dog run located on Glenlake Avenue next to the loading dock. If you feel that it is too difficult to take your dog to the dog run, please contact me and we will discuss your issues privately. Remember, the entire staff works hard to keep the landscape looking nice. Please show some respect for the building, staff and other residents; make that little effort to take your dog to the dog run.

Swimming pool & fourth floor deck: A memo went out May 15, with rules regarding the swimming pool and the fourth floor deck. These areas opened May 27. I am happy to report that Mary Beth Ruppe has been hired as our new pool manager/head lifeguard. She assured me that there will be water aerobics classes Tuesdays and Thursdays; more class days may be added in the future. If you plan to attend a class, please come to the office and sign a waiver. Please comply with the swimming pool and fourth floor deck rules & regulations.

cartridges

Manufacturers set inexpensive prices for their printers, expecting to make money by selling their expensive proprietary cartridges. However, cartridges are usually recyclable; Gerber Hart Library on Granville and most office supply stores and computer dealers will accept cartridges for recycling. Some even offer

free paper or a discount on a new cartridge.

You can save half or more of cartridge expense by refilling them yourself with store-bought kits or by having them refilled by the new "refill-station" stores. Look for these refill stations at Walgreens, Cartridge World and Office Max. Ink use can also be easily reduced by printing all but final copy on the printer's draft setting.

Restaurant Review

I just cannot get over the Andersonville business community. The restaurants are really thriving. They are growing in number and quality, too. In fact, the growth is apparent when you see people just crowding the sidewalks and streets and standing in line at the ice cream stores. Yes, I said stores. Peterson's ice cream is sold at Taste of Heaven and Madison's, (Wis.) Chocolate Shop products are sold at Sweet Occasions. Bakery goods can be bought at both of these locations and at the Swedish Bakery. No wonder there are so many young people and families lining up after having eaten lunch or dinner at the large variety of great restaurants on this street.

This article is about one of the newest establishments to open their doors. Olé Olé was long anticipated. The Olé Olé sign was up last spring and everyone was buzzing about what would come. The hopes were that it would be fresh and new and not take away from nearby restaurants. Well, it is fresh and it is new and it is good and it is hot. The first week people were being turned away because of the number of patrons wanting to try it out.

Our first time was at a group function that was semi-fixed menu and we were given limited choices for main course and dessert and glass of wine with the meal. When we arrived, we could order anything we wanted from the cash bar and free empanadas were served while we mingled and drank from a bar that tends to be stocked with many specialty drinks from south of the border. The empanadas were hot and good and were filled with baby spinach, scallions, herbs, white cheeses and spices. The drink menu includes a number of rum drinks, some including mint, lime juice, brandy, and sugar. Many of you may have heard of the mojito — well, it is a very fine drink, sort of the Cuban version of the mint julep. Special Patron Silver Tequila and Grand Marnier is the basis of the Olé Olé margarita. Sangrias are big and the

beers include many of the best from the Latin countries.

When we were seated as a group, our waiter gave us a selection of available dinner wines (including Sangria), main courses, side dishes and desserts. Almost everyone at our table chose their version of the carne asada — grilled steak. The flavor of that steak was fantastic and the portion was large, in fact two nice pieces of ribeye marinated with jalapeno, onion, garlic and thyme. Side dishes were garlic mashed yucca (a heavier, but tasty, potato-like root vegetable) or fried plantains. Both were good as I tasted my husband's. Other entries offered were pollo al limon, a fire-grilled half chicken marinated in lemon with a seasoned rice, and two vegetarian dishes: chile relleno, stuffed with spinach and Oaxaca cheese, and a paella that had no meats or seafood, only rice and vegetables. Dessert choices were the mango mousse with pistachio cake, strawberries and guava puree or the tres leches sponge cake with rum chantilly and a sauce of passion fruit with saffron. I loved everything I ate and drank and even took some leftover steak home.

The next time we went, there were three of us and we all decided to order their tapas — or appetizers. This method of ordering is one I like, since I would rather taste several things than have the full meal. It can be more economical, too, as long as you watch the number of items you order. We got out of control and wound up bringing home more for the refrigerator and future meals. The shrimp cocktail had four very large shrimps over a cold cocktail sauce that included some avocado. It was very good, and we shared this as well. We didn't order empanadas since we knew how they were (excellent), but our friend did get them and being a vegetarian, ordered the spinach variety in lieu of ground sirloin or the ham and cheese fried empanada. We were told that they serve two to an order and you could order two different kinds. Next time we will try the two meat versions. Our friend got the guacamole and said it was good, but would get it spicier next time. We chose the papa rellena dish



of some lightly breaded potato rounds stuffed with ground sirloin — a wonderful way to have your potatoes.

A favorite of mine is the goat cheese and tomato/basil over bread servings. Lovely goat cheese, but the toasted breads could be crisper. We ordered the vegetarian paella for the table and had to add that to the food we brought home for later. The vegetarian chili relleno was exquisite with the best cheese and spinach flavor in the soft and succulent poblano pepper — try it, very good. My friend and I chose to split a dessert. I know we shouldn't since we couldn't finish our meal, but the cajeta mousse with toasted coconut, chocolate and a tuile cookie for decoration was something we had to try. I am going to go for the bittersweet flourless cake with apricot sauce and brandy snap next time.

I didn't touch on the one thing I could have done without — and that was the ceviche. They used blue marlin instead of the red snapper that had been on the menu. I didn't care for the texture, but will be willing to try it again with a different fish or even shrimp. I usually love ceviche. There are many other dishes on the menu, and I know I will be back. Host Rick Sanchez is extremely pleasant and can be trusted to give you good hints on the foods they serve. He suggested the carne asada and he was right. The hours are listed below and they are going to open for lunch soon. The restaurant is warm and has a split level and the windows open up onto the street to capture the good weather we have been having. Make sure you try this place and bring friends to share the tapas.

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Security cameras

More Chicago Police security cameras are slated for installation on Edgewater streets. These cameras are connected to district police headquarters and are used for the surveillance of street activity in areas that have been deemed high in crime and/or gang activity or requested by the alderman or community organizations for specific security issues.


The most recent installation is at the Winthrop/Thorndale corner at the request of 48th Ward Ald. Mary Ann Smith. The Edgewater Chamber of Commerce is planning to install about three dozen cameras near four of the Edgewater elevated stations (Berwyn, Bryn Mawr, Thorndale and Granville) using funds from SSA #26.

Private citizens have previously installed cameras at “drug buy hot spots” including the NE and NW corners of Winthrop/Glenlake and the NE corner of Winthrop/Thorndale.

Editor’s note: The Loyola El station is not within the SSA #26 boundaries.




Chicago Police camera

Ilse Siegler honored

Malibu East's own Ilse Siegler, organizer of Malibu East's Thursday discussion group was honored along with Mary Pollack from Malibu, 6007 N. Sheridan Road, at a "There's No Place Like Home" program May 16 at Thorndale Beach South, 5855 N. Sheridan Road.

The two ladies gave short talks on their exceptionally interesting lives — their experiences during World War II.

Ms. Pollack was a nurse during the war and was attached to SNAG 56, a hospital unit stationed in the Victorian era hospital the Royal Victoria near Southampton. Her own memories were bolstered by those of other nurses and included the experiences of air raid shelter, Buzz Bombs and the overwhelming flood of casualties from the Normandy invasion.

Mrs. Siegler spent her youth in Nazi Germany during the 1920s and '30s. Her father was the president of the chamber of a small village. Although Ilse passed the exams for advanced education, she was denied the opportunity due to Germany's restrictions of Jews. The family moved to Stuttgart in hopes of becoming "invisible." Ilse had to go to Berlin for her studies.

On Kristallnacht, her father was taken along with all Jewish males and held for three and one-half months. He then decided to apply for permission to leave Germany and was eventually successful in taking his family to New York. Ilse was separated from her parents for four and one-half years and eventually moved to Chicago, where she married and raised her family.

Yikes, the bikes!

It's Saturday, the first day of a beautiful, long Memorial Day weekend and, as expected, the bikes are back on Sheridan Road sidewalks. But amazingly, not as many as expected. While standing on the Ardmore/Sheridan Road corner with five members of Mayor Daley's Bicycling Ambassadors, I noticed that probably 90 percent of the bicyclists were approaching the entrance to the lakeshore bike path legally down the bike lane on Ardmore and only a few were coming down the Sheridan Road sidewalk. But with hundreds of bicyclists out today, that left way too many — dozens — still riding on the sidewalks.

The Ambassadors were doing a splendid job of stopping most of the "illegals" and educating them with a short spiel explaining the ordinance concerning bikes on sidewalks and pointing them in the direction of bike lanes on Ardmore, Kenmore and Winthrop.

Eve Jennings (*top, second from right*), the Ambassadors' team leader, told me that all of her team members are new this year but have had extensive training, including a 60-mile team ride. She said that two other Ambassador teams were covering the Soldier Field 10-Mile Run and the Bike the Paths of the 30th Ward event today, and that her team will be at Grant Park Sunday for the "Bike the Drive" event.



In past years, the presence of the Chicago Police bike patrol has been one of the key elements in reducing bike traffic on Sheridan Road sidewalks. The former \$250 fine has been reduced to \$50, but unfortunately the old signs indicating the original fine have not been replaced with signs reflecting the change in the ordinance. An informed source says that the police are hampered in enforcing the ordinance until the signs are updated.
